# 2021 Legislative Overview

## ABOUT US

CCHI is a statewide, non-partisan, non-profit membership organization working so all Coloradans can get affordable, high-quality and equitable health care.

CCHI was created in 2000 to be a counterweight to powerful health care interests by building a cohesive consumer voice among health advocacy organizations and their constituents.

## MISSION

CCHI advances the consumer voice to improve access to health care for all Coloradans by working statewide for progress toward equity, affordability and quality.

## VISION

All Coloradans have equitable access to affordable, high-quality health care.

Colorado's 2021 legislative session was historic despite significant challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic, budget uncertainty, and bleak economic projections. Better-than-expected revenues and critical investments through the American Rescue Plan enabled the Governor and Joint Budget Committee to restore and increase funding for key priorities in health care and other issue areas.

Among important advances in police accountability, transportation, and the environment, Colorado made momentous advances in health care access, affordability, and equity. Rather than abandon any policy on the agenda during this atypical session, CCHI creatively and collaboratively reworked priority bills to advance consumer protections, public health, and health equity targeted more specifically to the social and political landscape. It was critical that CCHI pass legislation to target health and economic disparities laid bare and worsened by the pandemic ahead of a potentially politically charged 2022 session and major election cycle with significant legislative redistricting.

When considering legislation, CCHI focuses on equitably expanding access to care, increasing affordability across the health care system, and improving consumer protections, especially for consumers who have been historically excluded by the health care system--as well as protecting progress made in past sessions. This session, our highest priority bills were aimed at increasing affordability through establishing a Colorado public health insurance option, addressing high prescription drug costs by creating a Prescription Drug Affordability Board, and protecting consumers by strengthening Colorado's hospital financial assistance law.

CCHI took positions on 40 bills this session aimed at ensuring Coloradans' equitable access to high quality, affordable health care. We also supported a number of proposals aimed at breaking down upstream barriers, specifically agricultural workers' rights, renters' rights, and voting access. Below, we summarize legislation that addresses insurance coverage and affordability, reduction of underlying health care costs, and advancing health equity. The concerted efforts of CCHI staff and members throughout the session paid off with numerous wins for consumers to celebrate upon adjournment of the first regular session of the 73rd Colorado General Assembly.

# Costs, Coverage, and Affordability



1 in 5 Coloradans go without needed care because they cannot afford it, and many must choose between the care they need and affording necessary living expenses. Black Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC), people with disabilities, and low-income households are disproportionately affected by high health care costs and barriers to accessing care. The pandemic has highlighted the need for more affordable health care and CCHI, our broad coalition of advocacy groups, and Colorado state legislators stepped up to the plate to make significant strides towards addressing these challenges during the 2021 legislative session. While the fight to achieve true health equity has a long way to go, these bills are an important step forward to provide critical access to health care services and make coverage for those services more affordable and equitable for Colorado families.

## Key Bills



### **SB21-016 Protecting Preventive Health Coverage**

**Rep. Esgar & Rep. Mullica | Sen. Pettersen & Sen. Moreno**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Coloradans, regardless of gender, will be covered for STI counseling, screening, and prevention. This bill also strengthens access to family planning services for Medicaid patients and protects patient choice of provider.



### **SB21-025 Family Planning Service for Eligible Individuals**

**Rep. Tipper & Rep. Will | Sen. Pettersen & Sen. Coram**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Expanding Medicaid coverage for family planning services by increasing income eligibility limits from 133% up to 260% of the FPL, this bill supports the health and wellbeing of families and children by reducing unintended pregnancies, increasing financial security, and helps connect people to options for full insurance coverage.

## Colorado Option

### **HB21-1232 Standardized Health Benefit Plan**

**Rep. Roberts & Jodeh | Sen. Donovan**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

The Colorado Option is a bold step forward that prioritizes equity and access to affordable health care for everyone. The Colorado Option builds on existing infrastructure and leverages other recent policy advances like the Health Insurance Affordability Enterprise to bring more affordable coverage to consumers, lower health care costs, and hold the health care industry accountable to Coloradans. This bill provides more affordable and valuable health insurance options by lowering premiums, implementing a standardized plan to control and lower out-of-pocket costs, and makes fundamental advances to address pervasive racial health disparities through first-in-the-nation health equity requirements and ensuring these more affordable plans are available to all Coloradans regardless of documentation. More Coloradans will be able to have health insurance that is more affordable and provides better coverage and access to care, providing increased financial security for Colorado families and small businesses.



# Prescription Drugs

In recent years, prescription drug companies have been the subject of intense scrutiny—and for good reason. Rapidly increasing drug prices, a complex supply chain, and the amount health insurance companies charge patients all cause significant financial stress for consumers. Nearly 1 in 3 Coloradans have trouble affording their medications, often cutting pills, skipping doses, or not filling prescriptions. Historic and ongoing oppression has made BIPOC more likely to have chronic diseases that may require prescription drugs to maintain wellness and heightened barriers to accessing and affording medications and health care. The 2021 legislative session brought the following proposals to increase transparency, accountability, and address the sky high costs of prescription drugs for Coloradans.



## Key Bills



### **HB21-1237 Competitive Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM) Marketplace**

**Rep. Lontine & Rep. Rich | Sen. Kirkmeyer & Sen. Moreno**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Establishing a competitive PBM marketplace will lower costs for Colorado state government, private employers, and consumers by allowing PBMs to bid against each other in a reverse auction and allow state or private employers to select the lowest bidder.



### **HB21-1297 PBM And Insurer Requirements**

**Rep. Hooton & Rep. Will | Sen. Sonnenberg & Sen. Buckner**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

The bill enacts the "Pharmacy Fairness Act" which imposes requirements on contracts between PBMs and pharmacies.



### **HB21-1307 Prescription Insulin Pricing and Access**

**Rep. Roberts | Sen. Donovan & Sen. Jaquez Lewis**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

40% of Coloradans on insulin ration the drug due to cost. This bill caps the price of insulin for all diabetics regardless of insurance, and provides an emergency one-month supply once a year at reduced cost.



### **SB21-123 Expand Canadian Rx Import Program**

**Rep. McCormick & Rep. Lynch | Sen. Ginal & Sen. Coram**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Colorado will now be able to import less expensive prescription drugs from countries besides Canada, pending federal approval.

## Prescription Drug Affordability Review Board

### **SB21-175 Prescription Drug Affordability Review Board**

**Sen. Jaquez Lewis & Gonzales | Rep. Caraveo & Kennedy**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Colorado's Prescription Drug Affordability Board will be the first of its kind by establishing upper payment limits on certain high-cost prescription drugs for all payers. The board will conduct affordability reviews of drugs that are triggered by various means and ensure that savings are passed on to consumers. This bill may save Coloradans up to 75% on the most unaffordable drugs and will pave the way for a more equitable health care system that prioritizes the wellbeing of patients over profits for the pharmaceutical industry.



# Financial Security



Every Coloradan should be able to access necessary health care without getting pushed into crushing debt. However, the continued challenge of accessing and affording health care is causing financial stress for Colorado families and impacting their ability to live their healthiest lives. At least 15% percent of Coloradans, including 1 in 4 BIPOC Coloradans, have medical debt in collections - all while Colorado hospitals are experiencing record profits. High medical debt can have long-term consequences, including ruining credit and perpetuating vicious cycles of financial insecurity, poverty, particularly for low income and BIPOC Coloradans. Because medical debt and insufficient consumer protections have such a profound impact on consumers' financial stability, CCHI prioritized the following bills.

## Key Bills



### **SB21-169 Restrict Insurers' Use of External Consumer Data**

**Rep. Ricks & Rep. Esgar | Sen. Buckner**  
**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

This bill prevents insurance companies from using data and algorithms that result in unfair discrimination against consumers based on race, income, gender, or other economic or personal characteristics. It addresses longstanding concerns that insurers are varying insurance prices based on highly questionable socioeconomic data and prevents people from being charged more for all forms of insurance due to discriminatory reasons.



### **SB21-148 Office of Financial Empowerment** **Rep. Esgar & Rep. Tipper | Sen. Gonzales & Sen. Kolker**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

This bill creates an Office of Financial Empowerment (OFE) to offer proactive tools to build financial health and resilience. The OFE will offer one-on-one financial coaching, streamline consumer protections, and expand safe and affordable banking and lending products.



### **SB21-091 Credit Transaction Charge Limitations**

**Rep. Bird & Rep. Larson | Sen. Liston & Sen. Rodriguez**

**Pro-consumer vote NO | Status Passed**

This bill allows a surcharge of up to 2% for goods and services paid by credit card. Many low income Coloradans pay rent, child care, and medical bills with credit cards, and this bill places a greater financial burden on already economically vulnerable Coloradans. CCHI and partners recommended that medical, rent, and child care transactions be exempt from surcharges, but were unsuccessful.

## Hospital Financial Assistance

### **HB21-1198 Health Care Billing Requirements for Indigent Patients**

**Rep. Jodeh | Sen. Buckner & Kolker**  
**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

The bill improves upon Colorado's Hospital Financial Assistance law that CCHI and the Colorado Center on Law and Policy helped create in 2012 and 2014, and moves oversight to HCPF to improve enforcement. Hospitals will be required to screen uninsured patients for health coverage options and potential financial assistance for which they may be eligible. It also limits the amount that low-income patients pay for certain health services by tying what they owe to an established rate while also limiting the size of payments charged on a monthly basis. The bill prohibits hospitals from sending a patient to collections unless certain conditions have been met.

# Social Determinants & Health Equity



In order to improve the health of the people of Colorado, we must address structural barriers that create health disparities, and improve the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, and work. CCHI is committed to supporting policies that better address social determinants of health, alongside issues of equity, access, and affordability. The following bills aim to equip the state with a better understanding of community needs and enable targeted investment in health equity.

## Reproductive & Birth Equity Bills

### **SB21-193 Protection of Pregnant People in Perinatal Period**

**Sen. Buckner | Rep. Herod**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Pregnant people of color face discrimination and maltreatment in the health care system which perpetuates birth and maternal health disparities. This critical bill addresses multiple issues to increase autonomy for pregnant and birthing people throughout the perinatal period to ensure they are treated with dignity and respect.

### **SB21-194 Maternal Health Providers**

**Sen. Buckner | Rep. Herod**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

This bill addresses a variety of topics related to maternal health and health care professionals providing labor and delivery services. It requires HCPF to seek an amendment to the state Medicaid plan and the Children's Health Plan Plus to provide one year of postpartum medical benefits to qualified pregnant people.

### **SB21-009 Reproductive Health Care Program**

**Sen. Jaquez Lewis | Rep. Caraveo**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

This bill establishes the Reproductive Health Care program to provide contraceptives and family planning services for undocumented individuals. It also requires coverage of a one year supply of oral contraceptives for all Medicaid beneficiaries.

## Key Bills



### **HB-1108 Gender Identity Expression Anti-Discrimination**

**Rep. Esgar | Sen. Moreno**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

This bill protects Coloradans from discrimination on the basis of gender expression or identity.



### **SB21-018 Continuing of Necessary Document Program**

**Rep. Esgar | Sen. Moreno**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Without an identification card, Colorado residents cannot open bank accounts, pick up a prescription, or access health care, housing, employment, and public benefits. This bill ensures that the cost of an ID does not create additional barriers to social, financial, and health equity.



### **SB21-087 Agricultural Workers' Rights**

**Rep. McCormick & Rep. Caraveo | Sen. Danielson & Sen. Moreno**

**Pro-consumer vote YES | Status Passed**

Colorado agricultural workers deserve the same basic rights as all other workers in the state. Rectifying over 65 years of inequitable treatment, this bill sets standards for health, safety, and housing, provides fair pay and protections against overwork, and allows farm workers to unionize, bargain, and strike. Finally, this bill bans the use of the short-handled hoe, a tool that has become a symbol of oppression.

# Scorecard

## Bills We Scored

**HB21-1232 Standardized Health Benefit Plan** This bill provides more affordable health insurance options by lowering premiums, implementing a standardized plan to control and lower out-of-pocket costs, and makes advances to address racial health disparities through first-in-the-nation health equity requirements.

**SB21-175 Prescription Drug Affordability Review Board** This bill establishes a Prescription Drug Affordability Board to research, review, and set upper payment limits on the most unaffordable drugs for Coloradans.

**HB21-1198 Health Care Billing Requirements for Indigent Patients** This bill reforms Colorado's Hospital Financial Assistance Program by establishing clear and consistent billing and collection practices across providers. It will reduce the number of Coloradans sent to collections for receiving necessary health care.

**SB21-009 Reproductive Health Care Program** This bill provides contraceptives and family planning services for undocumented individuals and requires coverage for one year of oral contraceptives for all Medicaid beneficiaries.

**SB21-123 Expand Canadian Rx Import Program** Colorado will now be able to import less expensive prescription drugs from countries besides Canada, pending federal approval.

**SB21-169 Restrict Insurers' Use of External Consumer Data** This bill prevents insurance companies from using data and algorithms that discriminate against consumers.

**SB21-194 Maternal Health Providers** This bill addresses a variety of topics related to maternal health and health care professionals and creates a path for one year of postpartum medical benefits eligibility in Medicaid and CHP+ for birthing parents.

## What is the purpose of this scorecard?

The purpose of this scorecard is to inform CCHI's members, supporters, partners, and the public where our Colorado legislators stand when it comes to health care issues that affect consumers. While many policies are introduced to bring about change in our health care system each year, we want you to know which ones we believe are most important to creating equitable access to affordable, quality health care for all Coloradans - and how your legislator voted on them. This scorecard is not an endorsement of any legislator or political party.

## How did we choose which bills to score?

In 2021, CCHI took a position on 40 pieces of legislation. Due to the high number of bills on health and health care, we chose to score bills that were particularly meaningful to CCHI and on which we worked most actively. CCHI's policy committee, a committee composed of CCHI members, helped in the selection process and voted on the final 7 bills for the scorecard. These bills reflect CCHI's organizational priorities and policies with the potential to meaningfully impact access to care and improve affordability for Colorado consumers.

## So, how does it work?

We scored bills that were particularly meaningful to CCHI and on which we worked most actively. CCHI's policy committee, a committee comprised of CCHI members, helped in the selection process and voted on the final 7 bills for the scorecard. These bills reflect CCHI's organizational priorities and policies with the potential to meaningfully impact access to care and improve affordability for Coloradans.
